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Renovation Update

The design concepts presented to the Architecture Review Committee and the Governing Board were received with enthusiasm and applause. Our new Clubhouse will be an elegant reflection of members' opinions and suggestions made during the renovation planning process.

We are now proceeding through design development information in large-scale drawings into the construction document phase. Constructing an up-to-date and efficient building in the 21st century presents a number of demands and complexities, but we are slowly resolving the issues. The kitchen is really the engine of the Club and, therefore, will receive some much needed attention. We have decided that the obsolete equipment must be retired and that the space should be reconfigured to best address our dining and banquet needs. Our new meeting rooms on the fourth floor will have the latest technology systems installed. The renovation will also include a new roof terrace that all of us are looking forward to. Our IT infrastructure needs to be totally revamped to support all communication and security needs in the Club. The technology and back of house construction will all exist "behind the scenes" of our beautiful, traditional design. We are in the process of coordinating all the budgets and schedules to keep the project on target and progressing smoothly.

We still expect demolition work to commence on the third floor around the 5th of May.

Ambassador Frank G. Wisner, the former U.S. Special Envoy for the Kosovo Status talks, will speak about the impact of Kosovo's declaration of independence. He will discuss the effects the decision has had on the Balkans, Europe, and the United States.

Princeton alum Frank G. Wisner is Vice Chairman, External Affairs, at American International Group. A career diplomat with the personal rank of Career Ambassador, he previously served as Ambassador to India (1994-1997). Additionally, he held the positions of Ambassador to Zambia (1979-1982), Egypt (1986-1991), and the Philippines (1991-1992). Mr. Wisner has served in a number of positions in the U.S. government, including Undersecretary of Defense for Policy (1993-1994), Undersecretary of State for International Security Affairs (1992-1993), Senior Deputy Assistant Secretary for African Affairs (1982-1986), and Deputy Executive Secretary of the Department of State (1977). During the course of his career, Frank Wisner served in the Middle East and South and East Asia.

S.S. United States: Lady in Waiting**

Join us for a historic evening as we view the Public Television documentary *S.S. United States: Lady in Waiting* which details the history of this national flagship. The S.S. United States sailed as a passenger liner from New York City to Europe and other destinations from 1952 to 1969. The film features interviews with notables like Walter Cronkite and former crew members.

In her heyday, the ship was an engineering marvel and was considered the premier ocean liner in the world. Many celebrities sailed aboard the ship, including all the top movie stars, heads of state, and artists. Also, it was aboard this ship that Bill Clinton, Strobe Talbott, and Robert Reich met for the first time as they headed to Europe to begin their Rhodes Scholarships. Because the ship was partially funded by the Pentagon, she was seen as an important strategic asset to the U.S. She was a symbol of American strength at the height of the Cold War, and many immigrants to the U.S. arrived in New York City aboard her. Currently, she is in Philadelphia and facing an uncertain future after being gutted in the 1980's.

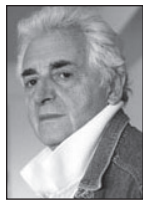
Private Tour and Brunch: Whitney Biennial 2008

Harry Benson: RFK- A Photographer's Journal

Wednesday, June 11, 6:30 pm

Join famed photographer Harry Benson as he shares his recollections and photos, marking the 40th anniversary of the assassination of Robert F. Kennedy.

Scottish born photojournalist Harry Benson arrived in America with the Beatles in 1964. Mr. Benson has photographed every U.S. President from Dwight D. Eisenhower to George W. Bush; was just feet away from Bobby Kennedy the night he was assassinated; stood in the room with Richard Nixon as he resigned; was there when the Berlin Wall went up and when it came down; and covered the aftermath of Katrina in New Orleans.

Mr. Benson's photographs are in the permanent collection of the Scottish National Portrait Gallery in Edinburgh, and the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery in Washington, D.C. In 2005, he received the LUCIE Award for Lifetime Achievement in Portrait Photography and has had 40 solo gallery exhibitions and 13 books of photography published. Mr. Benson is currently a contracted photographer with *Vanity Fair* magazine, and also shoots for *Architectural Digest*, *Newsweek*, and many other major publications.

His next book, *RFK: A Photographer's Journal*, will be released in June, marking the 40th anniversary of Robert F. Kennedy's assassination. Harry was with RFK during the campaign on a family holiday, before and after the assassination, and for the funeral train to Arlington Cemetery. Mr. Benson's book with autograph will be available for purchase at the event.

Stretching Is Not Enough

Stretching is very beneficial to the body and must not be neglected. In the case of muscle knots, stretching is not enough. When stretching a muscle with knots, you only stretch the healthy muscle tissue, and the knots have a tendency to recur. The knot remains a knot, laughing in the face of the stretch.

The best way to eliminate and prevent muscle knots is with a foam roller. Foam rollers are firm logs of different lengths, each about six inches in diameter. By using your body weight, you can apply direct pressure to your muscles. (Imagine using a rolling pin to roll out lumps in bread dough.) It is a highly effective way to treat and prevent the most common workout and running injuries.

Foam roll your knotted muscles for 5-10 minutes before your workout. They are available in the Fitness Center. Speak with our personal trainers for additional information.
